Through this we are able to provide leadership opportunities for students not on the board and ensure that our organization has a strong presence in high schools. There are active chapters present at all of the following schools: Cleveland High School, Grant High School, Forest Grove High School, Tigard High School, La Salle Catholic College Preparatory, Portland Christian School, Catlin Gabel School, Westview High School, Franklin High School, David Douglas High School, Saint Mary's Academy, and De La Salle North Catholic High School. Of those 12 chapters, five have been newly welcomed in 2018. The new chapters are Portland Christian School, Catlin Gabel School, Westview High School, Franklin High School, and De La Salle North Catholic High School.



# PRESENTATIONS

Through our presentations, YES aims to educate our community and peers about the prevalence of human trafficking, encourage solution-driven discussions and inspire action. Through educating the rising generation, we hope to end the lack of knowledge, misconceptions, and stigma that surrounds this issue. In 2018, YES presented at five high schools: McCoy Academy, The Delphian School, Oregon City High School, and Blanchet Catholic School, as well as the Sisters of the Holy Names Congregational Justice and Peace Network meeting.



### EVENTS

#### Art of Advocacy

Our annual Art of Advocacy open mic night was held in January of 2018, and it was a huge success! We loved seeing students express themselves in such creative ways.

#### Tony's Chocolonely documentary screening

In early February, YES had the wonderful opportunity to partner with Tony's Chocolonely to screen their documentary about their goal of eradicating slavery in the chocolate trade. This was a fantastic learning experience that got the community involved and led to further connections with Tony's during future events.



#### Jane Doe in Wonderland play

Jane Doe in Wonderland, a play meant to educate young people about human trafficking, was performed in Portland and Newberg in late March. The show was incredible, and YES loved getting the chance to meet and work with those putting it on and give feedback as to how it benefited youth in our community.

The co-founder and director of Global Health Promise, Brian Willis, spoke at the walk about his own work and how to better combat human trafficking. It was an informative as well as empowering event.

West Side Christian, Catlin Gabel, Westview, Forest Grove, and Tigard chapter leaders attended our Winter Chapter Conference. We discussed the progress of these chapters, possible fundraising ideas, and how we can better bring awareness to human trafficking.


#### Tony's Chocolonely


